Rosales, Avery, Williams Win Place on April 17 Ballot for Champaign City Council

All three Democrats on the ballot for Champaign City Council won in the February 27 primary election and will advance to the April 17 consolidated election, where they will run for three at-large seats on the council. Incumbent City Council member Giraldo Rosales, former County Board Chairwoman Patricia Avery, and Champaign resident Annette

Williams are running against Republicans Deb Frank Feinen, Karen Foster, and Tom Bruno. Rosales has a strong record on the issues during his first four-year term, including support for the smoking ban. Avery and Williams also support the ban, which Feinen and Foster have said they will vote to overturn if elected. Candidates submitted the information below.

GIRALDO ROSALES



For the past four years, incumbent Giraldo Rosales has enjoyed serving as Champaign City Council Member at-large. Rosales is a dedicated, tenacious, committed public

servant representing all of Champaign's citizens. Rosales brings together a broad range of community, public service, and government experience spanning over 27 years. For 11 years Rosales taught Bilingual Education to immigrant children whose lives mirrored his own in the Chicago inner-city neighborhoods. Born in Havana, Cuba, where his father served under Fulgencio Batista, Rosales enjoyed an orderly early life. But by 1963, after Fidel Castro, the family was forced to flee and found their way to Chicago, right in the midst of America's Civil Rights Movement. Since becoming the first Latino elected official in Downstate Illinois, Rosales found similarities in his immigration experience, the role of a politician is not always a popular one. Rosales believes in achieving balance throughout the city--not only in the representation among public officials, but also in the agenda that is represented by them.

PATRICIA AVERY



Patricia Avery was the first African American, first woman and first Democrat to be elected Chair of the Champaign County Board, serving in

that leadership role for two terms. Avery's eight years of County Board service and her experience as Chair of the Regional Planning Commission, county liquor commissioner, township appeals hearing officer and labor negotiator make her well-qualified for a city council seat. Avery is employed as the Executive Director of Champaign-Urbana Area Project, a community organization that provides youth programs to prevent juvenile delinquency. She has been a strong advocate for social justice and women's and children's issues.

Avery's priorities on the council are to promote economic development that benefits all residents, insure fiscal responsibility by balancing economic incentives with the city's need to fund infrastructure, roads, and other services, improve police and community relations, work to reduce utility costs, insure safe and affordable housing. She supports the creation of a civilian police review board and will uphold the smoking ban. She opposes a city gas tax.

ANNETTE WILLIAMS



Life-long Champaign resident and former school teacher Annette Williams is known for her caring and conscientious values. Williams has enjoyed working with diverse groups

of people within educational, church and civic communities and will bring that experience to serve all citizens of Champaign on the council.

Williams supports the smoking ban as a public health issue and believes that the majority of citizens prefer a smoke-free environment. Williams believes there is a need to improve police-community relations and supports the creation of a civilian police review board. Williams will advocate for affordable, safe housing for all residents. She supports appropriate economic growth and would carefully evaluate the city's incentives to wealthy developers to make sure that tax dollars are available for needed services.

Williams does not support a city gas tax and believes that developers should help pay for arterial road construction. Williams is committed to working for the common good of all citizens and maintaining our community's quality of life.

Democratic Meet Ups Focus on Issues: School Funding Reform, Health Care, The Environment

Illinois ranks 47th in the nation in the level of state support for education, according to Vickie Mahrt, Illinois Education Association board member who spoke at the February 15th Democratic Meet Up on school funding reform, held at Democratic headquarters. Mahrt said per pupil spending ranges from \$23,000 to \$4,500 across the state, and these inequities are drastically compromising the quality of education for many Illinois students. Illinois State Senator Mike Frerichs also spoke at the Meet Up about a bill he recently introduced to address adequate school funding, and Champaign School Board President Margie Skirvin provided a local perspective.

Democrats who attended the meeting were provided with extensive information and everything they needed to write letters to state legislators advocating school funding reform.

The Democratic Meet-Up Committee hosted the event, the first in a series of monthly meetings that will present an informational program on a specific is-

sue and provide the optional opportunity for volunteer action.

The March 14 Democratic Meet Up is scheduled for 7:00 pm at Democratic Headquarters and will examine the Future of Health Care in Illinois. Jim Duffet, Executive Director of the Campaign for Better Health Care will review health care legislation in Illinois.

The April Meet Up is scheduled for 7:00 pm on April 11 at the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, 3301 Boardwalk Drive in Champaign. Al Gore's award winning documentary film about global warming, *An Inconvenient Truth*, will be shown, followed by a panel discussion led by UIUC Professor David Kovacic. A pre-Arbor Day tree planting is planned for Saturday, April 14. See the calendar for details on these events.
